Project Description

A randomized study of innovative efforts to find permanent families for a minimum of 50 freed foster care youth with severe emotional, behavioral and developmental needs that require residential treatment.

~~ Over three years, 174 children will be selected for the study~~

 OCFS Division of Juvenile Justice;

Freed foster care youth with a goal other than adoption who reside in a:
 Residential Treatment Center



~ Update ~ **Children Selected for Year One** Random selection of 80 Youth from target universe of children ■ Intervention group - 40 children to receive service by project staff <u>Control group</u> - 40 children for comparison purposes only (no program intervention)



Intervention Group

Evaluator provided names to Project **Director for caseload assignments** Cases assigned to permanency specialists based on location of facilities across NYS: Hillside (10 children) Parsons (10 children) You Gotta Believe (20)



Control Group

 Names provided to Project Supervisor for assignments
 Regional adoption specialists (OCFS) assigned youth in their regions
 Work with local districts with children
 Complete template annually for each child
 Submit data for entry in database



Development of Database

 Web-based interactive database
 Pre-populated with administrative data
 Project staff trained to navigate database
 Data entry technology integrated into staff work
 On-going quality control of data entries

Control group data entry by evaluators



Intervention Group Our Goal

- To match each youth with a committed adult willing to assume the role of a lifelong parent.
- To provide each committed parent access to training, services and support.
- To support the efforts of the permanency professionals to improve permanency outcome for the youth.

Permanency Specialists

- Specialists received adoption competency training and assigned cases.
- Specialists received clearance to access confidential records of youth.
- Specialists trained by evaluators in the use of the web-based database.



Permanency Activities

All youth were assigned a permanency specialist based on the location of the facility caring for the youth.

All youth records were reviewed by permanency specialists and mined for potential permanency options.



Permanency Activities

- Permanency specialists attend treatment and planning meetings at the facilities.
- Permanency specialists contacted:
 Local districts with guardianship and custody of the youth selected for the project.
 - Residential facilities where the selected youth reside.



Permanency Activities

Permanency activity on youth entered in database by specialists.
 80% of the youth had an initial contact with permanency specialists.
 Potential permanency resources for 12 youth.



Challenges

Youth changing placement

- Distance of facilities
- Youth agreement to participate in search for permanent resource
- Facility staff feeling youth is not ready for a family

OMRDD offer youth lifetime care options

Agencies prohibiting staff from being permanent resource to youth in care



Next Steps

- Chronicling of youth produce video tapes of PFEC youth .
- Complete report on characteristics of target population.
- Complete year one data collection on control group .
- Hold meetings with cross-systems stakeholders.
- Role out public awareness campaign.Complete and print Barriers Study.
